East Lake Sammamish Trail - South Sammamish segment design underway


King County is moving forward with design of the South Sammamish segment of the East Lake Sammamish trail (ELST). This segment will be designed and constructed in two phases:

- Segment A SE 43rd Way to SE 33rd St (approximately 1.2 miles)
- Segment B SE 33rd St to Inglewood Hill Road (approximately 3.6 miles)
 nstruction of Segment A could begin as early as spring 2015 followed by

Construction of Segment A could begin as early as spring 2015 followed by construction of Segment B in 2016.

How will the trail be improved?

Safety and accessibility will be improved with a new 12-foot-wide paved trail with twofoot soft surface shoulders on each side and enhanced intersections, crossing treatments, and drainage. This spring, King County will begin construction on the North Sammamish segment, from NE 187th St to Inglewood Hill Road. The North Sammamish segment will be closed for approximately one year. Check out the completed segments in Redmond and Issaquah!





How is the trail alignment developed?

King County is designing the trail alignment based on the following considerations:

- Complying with local, state and federal environmental regulations to avoid and minimize impacts to environmentally sensitive areas
- Meeting regional trail standards and national safety guidelines, including maintaining clear sight distances
- Staying within King County right-of-way
- Building a safe trail through steep terrain and complicated intersections
- Minimizing costs where possible without impacting trail standards
- Minimizing impacts to adjacent homeowners whenever possible
- Preserving significant trees when possible

Landscaping the trail corridor

King County will make every effort to minimize impacts to existing landscaping. However, the paved trail will be wider than the gravel trail and requires clearing beyond the edge of the existing trail to build retaining walls, environmental features, and drainage improvements. The project includes new plantings to restore the project area and achieve the following goals and objectives:

Open sightlines

- Open sightlines at road and driveway trail crossings to improve safety
- Site distance triangles will be restored with plants less than three feet high at full maturity

Permanent erosion control

• The most immediate function of trail landscaping is to restore open ground areas with landscape mulch and plantings or seeding to prevent erosion

Native plants


Native plants, shrubs, and groundcover plants offer many benefits; they:

- Are well adapted to thrive in local conditions of drought or excess moisture
- Require less maintenance, growing to natural sizes and forms
- Blend well into the natural surroundings along the trail corridor
- Contribute to a sense of visual continuity along the trail corridor and help make the trail feel like a park



Trees are planted at least 10 feet away from the trail to promote healthy growth and prevent roots from damaging new pavement.

Intersections – designed to improve safety

Safety is a top priority for King County. The new trail includes enhanced intersections and crossing treatments that improve safety by:

- Providing open sightlines for trail users, motorists, and pedestrians crossing the trail
- Providing clear visual and textural difference from the asphalt trail with concrete treatment at intersections
- Warning trail users of approaching intersections with textured concrete warning bands 75 feet ahead of each crossing
- Identifying intersections clearly through consistent signage, striping, and bollards along the trail corridor

Did you know?

Fish friendly culverts

The North Sammamish segment includes building four culverts to enhance fish passage and approximately one acre of habitat improvements. Design of similar enhancements is underway for the South Sammamish segment.
